"Ben Davis - '100 Years' - Formally Inducted

Into the African American Golfers Hall of Fame A Special Ceremony"

West Palm Beach, Fla. (August 26, 2012) - The "8th Annual African American Golfer's Hall of Fame (AAGHOF) Conference, Tournaments, Reception, Dinner, Auction & Awards Celebration" & "2nd Annual African American Collegiate & Youth Golfer Hall of Fame (AAC&YGHOF) was held at The President Country Club, West Palm Beach, FL during the period May 24-28, 2012. The Annual AAGHOF Black Tie Optional Reception & Awards Dinner Celebration" was held on May 27, 2012. "We were excited and very pleased to partner with and have the support of the Palm Beach County Sports Commission & Palm Beach County Sports Hall of Fame this year", said Malachi Knowles, Founder. "This is a great opportunity to support our premier international organization dedicated to the history of African Americans in the sport of golf" said George Linley, Executive Director, Palm Beach County Sports Commission.

Inducted but not present was Michigan Golf Legend Erellon Benjamin "Ben" Davis who celebrated his 100th birthday on February 19, 2012 at a Southfield, Michigan nursing care facility. President Barack H. Obama (United States of America) sent him a special birthday letter.

Ben Davis was born in Pensacola Florida, and reportedly was an excellent player as a youth. As you might expect, however, he had few opportunities to play golf in the Jim Crow South. Davis traveled to Detroit in 1925 on the advice of his instructor, Tony Penna. He graduated from Northern High School in Detroit and launched his professional golf career at the Pine Crest Driving Range in Ferndale, Michigan in 1936. He began teaching at Rackham Golf Course in Huntington Woods, Michigan in 1952, where he eventually became a Class 'A' head professional, *the first Black head pro at a municipal course in the United States of America*. He taught at Rackham for many years and held their course record. "In 1966, Davis became the first African American admitted to the Michigan PGA. In 1968, he also became the first African American head pro at Palmer Park Golf Course in Detroit. Continuing to play excellent golf as a Senior, Davis won the Michigan Senior PGA Championship in 1974 and the U.S. National Senior Tournament in 1979 in Las Vegas. Davis was inducted into the Michigan Golf Hall of Fame in 1992." His students included boxing legend Joe Louis and Detroit Pistons Hall of Famer Bob Lanier."

"He still hit the links until just a few years ago", Thomas said of his great-uncle. "He was always a friendly man, very social, and had a lot of friends. He was always respected as a professional, and that's what he always wanted to be, and he was," Thomas said. "It was his tenacity, his 'I'm going to do this regardless of how people feel,' and his 'stick it to it-ness." In his own words, Davis has his late wife of 56 years to thank for his accomplishments. "I owe it all to my wife, Ruby, because she (insisted) on breakfast every morning, some rest at night, (regularly) get your checkups from your doctor, and keep a cool head," Davis wrote some years ago.

Today, "2011 AAGHOF Youth Golfer of the Year" Evette F. Booker, Junior at the Detroit International Academy formally inducted Mr. Davis into the African American Golfers Hall of Fame during a special ceremony at the Southfield nursing facility with family members and friends attending. Founder Knowles stated afterwards that "he asked Miss Booker to perform the ceremony because she truly represents the future of golf." Evette plans to join the Adams Golf Junior Tour in the spring of 2013. Evette stated that "it was truly an honor for her to perform the ceremony for the entire membership of the African American Golfers Hall of Fame, especially the African American Collegiate and Youth Golfers Hall of Fame." Anna Booker, Evette's mom, shared with Ben's niece, Dorothy King that "she hopes that the African American Golfers Hall of Fame continues to honor those who blazed the trail before them and include the youth so that they will always have their history in perspective."
